Bring another agent or colleague along, especially for vacant or remote properties.

Keep Your Phone Charged and Accessible

Always have your phone within reach and pre-program emergency contacts.

Consider carrying pepper spray, a whistle, or a personal alarm.

Be Cautious with Open Houses

Secure valuables, avoid being alone at the end, and always check every room before locking up.

Watch What You Share Online

Avoid posting live location updates or personal routines on social media.
